1. Swan upping

Swans were regarded as a status symbol as well as a delicacy in medieval England. According to a medieval legislation, the Queen owns all unmarked mute swans on "certain stretches of the Thames and its surrounding tributaries." To this day during the third week of July, all the swans on the Thames are counted for the Queen in a practice called Swan Upping. It is held not just to establish the ownership of each swan, but also to check up on their health and to conserve their population.

Enigma (noun)

Meaning: Something or someone that is puzzling or a riddle

Origin: The word "enigma" first appeared in print in 1449. Its origins remain as mysterious as the word itself. It is likely to derive from the Latin *aenigma*, meaning a riddle, or the Greek *ainigma*, which derives from the word *ainisesthai*, "to speak obscurely, speak in riddles." An example of an enigma is: "Which came first, the chicken or the egg?"

Usage of the word:

- Even to the ace sleuth Sherlock Holmes, the motive behind the crime was an enigma.
- The magician's trick was an enigma to everyone in the audience.
